Mapping the Ecosystem



Three surveys in six countries

- Directed to funders, RPOs and publishers
- Conducted between April and June 2012
- To be published in November 2013
- Material for evidence-based policy development overall, per survey and per country

Participation

- 221 RPOs (44% response rate)
- 187 publishers (19% response rate)
- 16 funders (12% response rate)

The Research Funders

- RFOs do not seem to perceive access to the research they fund as an integral part of their responsibility
- Half with open access policies, mostly voluntary
- Unregistered policies

 Systematic engagement necessary, especially in order to align with recommednation and Horizon 2020



Research performing organizations

- RPOs mainly universities with repositories (80%) and some voluntary and non-policed policies (50%)
- Most policies concern PhD Theses
- Repositories contain diverse materials
- Libraries heavily involved in repositories
- Diverse landscapes in different countries

- Concrete and mandatory policies necessary
- Attention to peer-reviewed research necessary
- Priority towards green-open access=repositories



Publishers

- Largely societies and other academic and institutional presses, medium-sized, mainly in the SSH
- Positively disposed towards open access, many provide open access
- Liberal attitudes towards self-archiving
- Concern about financial viability
- Lack of formalized and explicit policies
- Awareness-raising regarding copyright, licensing and business models necessary



The Open Access Tracker

- Online tool for systematic one-stop-shop presentation of information on open access in six countries
- Lasting tool for tracking growth of various aspects of open access per country
- Tool that interoperates with existing major services internationally
- Encourages stakeholder community to register policies and activities
- May be expanded to track other types of policies and strategies, as well as countries
- Contribute to harmonization of information contained in various registries

National coordination



National coordination

- Enable each country to move towards coordinated national agendas on open access with emphasis on policy development
- Facilitate synergies between various actors in each country
- Facilitate the continuous flow of information on open access developments, especially policy developments, in a coordinated way
- Facilitate the development and implementation of coordinated policies in each country

National Coordination: How

- Policymaker engagement and task forces
- National open access workshops
- Guidelines for policy development in the language of each country

- Policymaker engagement ongoing work
- Also to be extended in the future



National processes: outcomes

- Stakeholders brought together, sometimes for the first time and foundation work for systematic development of common principles and policies at the national level
- Forged synergies between previously fragmented groups
- Open access policies brought decisively into the agenda of policymakers
- Outcomes of policymaker engagement in varying success in the different countries.

Regional and European Coordination

- UMinho workshop and current conference
- Enhanced collaboration between organizations in the project countries
- Enhanced coordination and collaboration with other relevant projects/initiatives
- MedOANet guidelines for research funding organizations (RFOs) and research performing organizations (RPOs)



European Coordination: the MedOANet guidelines

- Directed to RFO and RPO decision-makers
- Concise, comprehensive and evidence-based guidance:
 - Main steps for implementing policies
 - Most significant components of a policy
 - Best practices in policy development and implementation
 - Summaries of essential concepts
 - Model policies

In seven languages!



Main points in guidelines

- Mandatory self-archiving
- Open access when possible (RPOs) and no more than 12 months embargo (RFOs)
- Emphasis on peer-reviewed research
- Start the discussion on open access to research data by recommending it

Main outcomes

- Set the open access policy agenda to policymakers or intensified process, contributing towards policy alignment
- Brought together stakeholders and policymakers in taskforces for coordinated national approaches, with perspective to the future
- Mapped the open access ecosystem offering data for evidence-based policymaking
- Set standards through the guidelines
- Reinforced the abilities of the partners as centers of expertise
- Reinforced collaboration and coordination between the countries
